Through Baker Donelson's Diversity Speaker Series, we routinely host events and opportunities to help bridge the gap of cultural awareness and break down barriers. Below is a recap of recent internal and external events or webinars.

- Black History Month: In our special month-long series of conversations, Black History Month Not All Heroes Wear Capes: Leading Professionals and Their Role Models, we highlighted historic and current black leaders and their journeys to success, particularly women of color. Our speakers discussed the historic sit-ins, their role models, how they have used their experiences to empower and give voice to their communities, and how racial differences continue to influence each of us. - Women's History Month: Women's History Month was created to celebrate the specific
 achievements women have made over the course of American history. We spent the month in
 reflection acknowledging the struggles and honoring the female leaders who have helped paved the

 career development, leadership, mentorship, women we admire and more. The discussion continued
 to help us internally break down barriers by celebrating women leaders in today's workforce.
- Deaf Awareness and Culture: To help raise awareness of deaf culture, we hosted an internal
 discussion with an expert who shared some of his personal experiences growing up signing and
 provided us with insights on Deaf culture, Deaf idioms, using American Sign Language versus
 English, modes of communication, tips for working with hearing impaired individuals and working with
 qualified sign language interpreters.
- Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month/Pride Month: We hosted an intimate
 discussion with a well-known comedian, actor, musician, advocate and entrepreneur about ways to
 use comedy as a tool in difficult discussions. Speaking from her personal experience, our special
 guest talked about how she has used comedy to help guide difficult experiences in a positive way, as
 well as how to avoid the flip side, when well-intentioned humor goes wrong.
