Student-Athletes as Plaintiffs

 Most challenges to the NCAA's amateurism model begins with the same concept:

"I should get paid because..."

O'Bannon v. NCAA and Antitrust law

"I should get paid because the NCAA has a monopoly on college athletics, and ..."

O'Bannon v. NCAA: Ninth Circuit appeal

Title IX Athletics High Dollar Settlements

Strength coaches, director of sports medicine, and media director settled for hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Title IX Athletics High Dollar Settlements

- A university recently settled a lawsuit filed by a coach terminated after 11 straight losing seasons.
 - How much did the university pay to settle?

 - Medical and Training Facilities and Services
 - Housing and Dining Facilities and Services
 - Publicity
 - Support Services
 - Recruitment of Student-Athletes

Title IX: The Three-Prong Test

- Equality of Opportunity
 - The Three-Prong Test
 - Prong One: Proportionality
 - Prong Two: Progress towards proportionality
 - Prong Three: Fully and effectively accommodating the interests and abilities of the members of the underrepresented gender
- Equality of Scholarships
- Provision of Resources

National Prong One Compliance 2014-2015

NCAA All Divisions (1,078 total schools)


- < = -5%: 772 schools (71.6%)
- Between -5% and -2%: 100 schools (9.3%)
- Between + -2%: 129 schools (12.0%)
- Between +2% and +5%: 42 schools (3.9%)
- > = +5%: 35 schools (3.2%)

581 schools (53.9%) are -10% or worse.

Statistics were self-reported by schools to the Department of Education for the 2014-2015 school year.

Second Title IX Program Area: Scholarships

- Equality of Opportunity
- Equality of Scholarships
 - Scholarship dollars to be awarded to women and men in same proportion as their respective rates of participation in the intercollegiate athletics program
 - Within 1.0%
 - Legitimate, non-discriminatory justifications for any larger disparity
- Provision of Resources

National Scholarship Compliance 2014-2015


NCAA Divisions I and II (656 total schools)

- < = -5%: 42 schools (6.4%)
- < =-1%: 150 schools (22.9%)
- Between +-1%: 96 schools (14.6%)
- >= +1%: 410 schools (62.5%)
- > = +5%: 239 schools (36.4%)
- > = +10%: 64 schools (9.8%)

Statistics were self-reported by schools to the Department of Education for the 2014-2015 school year.

FLSA Overtime Rules: Recent Changes Require Immediate Attention

- FLSA overtime rules become effective December 1,
 2016 within the budgetary cycle that begins in a month.
- Salary threshold is doubling
 - Employees earning less than \$47,476 are eligible for overtime.
- Exemptions
 - Coaching is teaching (but recruiting is not)
 - Graduate and undergraduate students
 - Academic counselors and advisors
